

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Training for SEI and ESL Instruction (39, 50 and 52)

Paragraphs 50 and 52 charge the District to provide a training on ESL curricula and to ensure that core content teachers of ELs are adequately trained to shelter content.

Consistent with any training reports, we are required to submit an overview of the training, location, presenter, sign-in sheets, PowerPoint presentations and any documents distributed during training. Such reports consisted of over 1,000 pages of documentation for Paragraph 50 alone and over 200 for Paragraph 52c.

Among the 143 core content teachers of ELs who are not SEI endorsed:

- 6 passed a BPS RETELL course but their paperwork may still be in process.
- o 80 are 1st year provisionals with a 1-year window to obtain the SEI endorsement.
- 42 are returning provisionals who may have been waived due to other district requirements (e.g., diversity, hard to fill position)
- 2 are identified as substitute teachers or temporary.
- 13 are a range of other employees providing core content instruction to at least 1 EL




Each year, we provide a list of training sessions offered to SLIFE teachers. Some sessions include foundational standards and monthly SLIFE PD.

- The training was held on October 17, 2018 and over 35 staff participated in the training.




Notification of EL Services

- We have provided information to incoming EL families to BPS pertaining to the various EL programs and services offered by the district.
- This year, we reformatted the information so that it can be provided in the form of a pamphlet for parents and guardians.

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EL School Assignment (32(b))



Consistent with previous reporting, ELs are assigned to their first and second school choices at a higher rate than non-ELs, 57% compared to 32%, and 19% compared to 15% respectively. Furthermore, the rate of Administrative Assignment for ELs is lower than non-ELs, 9% compared to 11%.

Supports for ELSWD (72 and 75)

Paragraph 72

This District is charged with maintaining and providing a list of qualified professional bilingual Special Education evaluators:

- Bilingual staff for related services speak a host of various languages including but not limited to: ASL, Spanish, Cantonese, Mandarin, Portuguese, Haitian Creole, Arabic, Vietnamese, Hebrew, Greek
- We also utilize some assessments that are available in Spanish such as the Clinical Evaluation of Language Fundamentals and Expressive One Word Picture Vocabulary Test
- Translation and interpretation services are also provided for matters pertaining to Special Education

Paragraph 75

- The District is required to use the past observation tool served to look at the instructional practices for English Learners at McKinley Schools.
 - This year an initial meeting was held on October 3, 2018 with the Headmaster, LATF, the Director of English Learners with Disability (ELSWD) and two members of the OEL instructional team to complete an initial walk through observation and to discuss dates for the formal observations in Winter 2019.
 - The observation tool will be used at two site visits and debriefs will be designed to guide the reflective practice conversations amongst staff in to build upon best practices for ELSWD at all McKinley sites.



Report on 2018 EL Summer Programs (79 and 80)

BPS EL Summer Academies

5-Week Academic Enrichment program focuses on grade level academic skills in ESL/English Language Arts and Math. In addition to academics, the program includes enrichment activities focused on STEM, Arts, Leadership Building, and Physical Fitness.

EL Summer Academies through 5th Quarter Portfolios

OEL partnered with 5th Quarter Portfolio for the first time this year to allow all BPS schools and non-profit organizations the ability to offer summer learning programs to our students as well as to have a more streamlined process in programming.

EL Internship Program through Private Industry Council

Classroom at the workplace combines a paid job with academic support and career development opportunities for compensatory students. Following class, students report to work and utilize academic skills in an employment context. Students work for 25-40 hours per week depending on the employer.

Partnership Programs through Community Based Organizations


CBOs specialize in providing supplemental services to ELs to support the acceleration of English development. Each approved CBO specialized in providing services for students who speak one or more of the major languages spoken in BPS other than English.

iReady Diagnostic and Instruction

iReady provides reports that track ELs progress toward mastery of the Common Core State Standards and that explicitly inform instructional decision making for teachers of English learners.







SY1819 Student Enrollment in Advanced Learning/Programs






